class of 1981 Reunion



Who influenced you the most during your time at CCHS and Why? Coach Copeland was a very influential teacher and person during my time at CCHS. What advice would you give current college students interested in pursuing a career in your field? If I could give advice to college students pursuing a degree in special education, or education in general, it would be to make the most of every experience that you get in the classroom.
